Take Stock in Children mentoring and scholarship program provided 270 deserving, low-income students with one-on-one support through caring volunteer mentors, professional college success services, with the continued opportunity to earn a Florida Prepaid college scholarship this school year.

For the third straight summer, we hosted the STEM camp for Take Stock in Children scholars. Funded by the Duke Energy Foundation, students learned about: Engineering Disciplines, Forensics, Microbit Coding, 3D Printing, and Water Conservation. We partnered with Campbell-Spellicy Engineering, Solar Impact, UF Engineering and science teachers from Buchholz and Gainesville High Schools for this camp.


Teacher Support & Teacher of the Year


ElevatEd is a teacher professional development conference led by our teachers held June 2, 2023 with keynote speaker Principal Kafele.

In collaboration with the Education Foundation and school district's Professional Development Department, Alachua County's Teacher Leadership Council hosted this event to elevate and celebrate the teaching profession.

There were 177 educators in attendance, the largest ever. In a post survey, 100% of them stated they would implement something they learned at this conference in their classrooms during this school year.

This only highlights one of four districtwide professional development opportunities supported by our Foundation. In addition to the funding used for the Teacher of the Year event.





On January 26, 2023, we celebrated the 31st Annual Robert W. Hughes **Teacher of the Year Program.**

Catalyst for Change Grants

This year we awarded innovative teachers:

9 STEM grants, and **10** traditional grants for a total **\$66,095.86** in classroom grants. **PLUS** 4 districtwide initiatives were awarded for a total of 23 projects that impacted:

12,865 students and 648 teachers impacted.

These projects are designed to reduce educational disparities, and focus on:

- Low-Performing Students
- STEM
- · Career/Technical Education
- Literacy
- Teaching Quality/Improving Classroom Instruction
- · High School Graduation Rates

The grants featured here are just two of the amazing grants awarded during the 2022-2023 school year.





Littlewood Elementary Book Club Teacher: Charlotte Grace Impacted 50 readers

Early literacy is a key focus for the school district. This project addresses the School's Improvement Plan goal of lessening the English Language Arts achievement gap from 42% to 39%.

By reducing the achievement gap and increasing reading efficacy, the book club contributes to this goal by encouraging a love for learning.

Seahorse Key Experience Teacher: Emily Taylor Lawton Chiles Elementary 110 students and 5 teachers

This project implemented project-based STEM programs through a field trip experience to UF's research center in Cedar Key. A majority of students had never seen the ocean. Mrs. Taylor said, "This is absolutely the best day of my 20+ years of teaching!"

Participating in this field investigation increased our students' ecological and social knowledge and taught them about the importance of sustaining wildlife resources.

Close to **300 guests** enjoyed a Masquerade themed evening celebrating the talents of Alachua County Public School students and the impact of The Education Foundation.


